Parsons Brinckerhoff Resilience Disaster Awareness Report

The Parsons Brinckerhoff Resilience DART (Disaster Awareness Report) summarizes key developments related to resilience planning and design across the US, including the region affected by Superstorm Sandy.

### Washington, DC/National/International

- Federal disaster policy is slowly moving from recovery to mitigation in light of the human impacts and the financial cost to the federal government, which was approximately \$120 billion for Katrina and \$60 billion for Sandy (link below).

- A 2015 report from the New York City Panel on Climate Change has been released; it is estimated that annual temperatures will rise between 4.1 and 5.7 degrees and that sea levels will rise by 11 to 21 inches by the 2050s, while extreme weather may be more common due to climate change (links below).
